



A circuit to the South near the Sudan border that will allow us to flirt with the Tropic of Cancer.

We will embark in Marsa Alam or Hamata. The reefs of St. John's are very varied. The circuit, alternating between falling and diving into the median space, the dive will delight all lovers of breathtaking drop-offs as well as passion for macro photographers. We can cross turtles, dolphins, sharks, napoleons and for those who choose the circuit St John's / Fendira, large parrot bumps. (As with all circuits, order and site selection can not only be contractual, they can vary: cause of the weather and / or state of the sea.

**You will pass magnificent sites such as:
Habli Ali**

Is a beautiful reef in the shape of a horseshoe that has regularly schools of dolphins (*Tursiops truncatus*). We will do our first dive from the back "in fins." (weight ...) So we can watch the dolphins either diving or by PMT. They are very often outside the reef or the lagoon

This beautiful shoal, while length, 150 meters long and 50 meters wide, dates back to one or two meters from the surface. It is oriented east / west. The boat will be anchored to the south / west or south / east of the reef. We will

usually drop on the north, returning along the drop off towards the side where letting the current carry our boat. As soon as we switch back, we will go down in the area of -30/40 meters to observe the pelagic. We will see evolve over the course tuna, barracuda and reef sharks. Sometimes, a hammerhead shark may wander around. On this falling north you can see large bushes of black coral. Then we leave the deep zone, with the flow. If you return to the west, you pass through a garden of giant sea fans in the vicinity of -25/30 meters. Also remember to check back regularly in the blue, because it is common to see dolphins pass (*Tursiops*) in the morning on this site. Do not hesitate at the end of diving, strolling through the landing zone, look at the top of the plateau, life abounds.

Habili Gafar

One of the most spectacular sites in the vast area of St John's. This reef is on the surface only 15 meters wide by 30 feet long. Imagine, a steep cone widens slowly to the zone of 20 meters, to form a small plateau before resuming its descent up to 80 meters. Generally, the current is strong enough on this site. We descend along the north side of the "cone", to reach the area of -30/35 meters. On the descent, we perceive the small plateau that materializes this depth. Here, on the north face in the course we have all chances to cross more pelagic. It is not uncommon to spend sandbar shark or even



other species. Then we go up again along the reef, describing a slow upward spiral. The wall is extremely rich Alcyonarians of all colors, hard coral, clouds of Anthias, snappers, barracudas, tuna, carangas Before heading at the end of diving into your boat, take the time to look over the reef in the landing zone. You will be surprised again by the diversity of species living there.



Erg Om Aruk

A site where it will be very hard to follow recommendations for duration of your instructor or board diving supervisor! It is so enchanting that it is difficult to go back in time and hours! The site consists of a main reef by 80 m in diameter and a large number of coral colonies to the south / east and north.

Divers have dubbed this site "Halong Bay". The boat docks at the South / East, as soon as we launch the boat, we are immersed in the middle of the magic of multi-colored towers all the richer one than the other. You

will come across countless shoals of fusiliers, surgeons, by heading north to reach the "Great Halong Bay."



There, towers flush with the surface and down on a background of about 20 to 27 meters, waiting for you. They are as rich as each other, all overlooking the colorful play of light, the magical aspects to this site. You can sometimes see a white shark or a shark heading to the north into the ocean . By return to the boat, you will have great chance to meet a huge Napoleon, who is often in the area under the boat or around. A site that is very different from large falling but remains a landmark of St John's circuit.
